SOMETHING OLD, SOMETHING NEW!

The most recent NFB Club Film Day, on May 21, included two much-loved classics and two new productions. The French-language programme commenced with Robert Awad's enduring 1980 satirical drama LA FIÈVRE DU CASTOR/THE NATIONAL SCREAM, about mysterious disappearance of Canada's national beaver! This was followed by Carole Laganière's touching and powerful new documentary COUNTRY, sharing the passion of those who love country and western music every summer season in Quebec.

Producer, Jacques Turgeon joined the audience to provide more information about the making of the film and the

world of rodeos and cowboys, musicians and singers, as well as to answer questions about the film.

The English-language programme opened with John Weldon's delightful animated LOG DRIVER'S WALTZ, based on the folksong sung by Kate and Anna McGarrigle. We were then privileged to see PASSAGE, a brand new docudrama by John Walker, co-produced by Kent Martin in Halifax. This was in fact an avant-premiere, as the film had only just returned from a highly successful screening at Hot Docs in Toronto. The film combines dramatic recreation and documentary to recount the search for Sir John Franklin and his crew of 128 men, who had perished in the Arctic ice, searching for the Northwest Passage.

John Walker joined us after the screening to tell us the fascinating background to the making of his epic 110-minute film - and to answer many questions from the enthusiastic audience.

Several Club members remarked on the advantage of being able to view enjoyable

short film classics from the past, together with the most important new NFB productions - and to meet and talk with the filmmakers themselves. The NFB provides the privileged setting of Theatre 1, with its comfortable seating and excellent projection facilities, to add to our enjoyment.

Although I am regretfully stepping down from the Club committee, I will definitely continue to attend these precious Film Days. We are fortunate to have the opportunity to enjoy "something old and something new" on the big screen, in the company of our friends and colleagues!

AN AFTERNOON WITH BILL WEINTRAUB

Hi Bill! Our Newsletter readers are interested in what people have been doing since they left the NFB. Could you please give us an update?


Well, I was a writer and journalist before I came to the Film Board, did a little bit of that at the Board and when I left, went back to writing of one sort or another. I did some freelance work and restructuring of films and narrations for the private sector. In fact, I made only one film after I left the Board, the controversial RISE AND FALL OF ENGLISH MONTREAL, which I felt passionate about. I took the initiative and fought with the Film Board in order to get it made, under contract to the Board. After that, I didn't really have any great urge to get involved with films.

That's when I was involved in Alliance Quebec, the old Anglo rights lobby. I was a member of the board, a militant Anglo, agitating against the injustices of Bill 101. So RISE AND FALL.... was taken under their wing and Alliance Quebec organized many screenings of it and I was asked to become a member of their board. This was during the times when I felt very passionate about the infringements of the rights of the Anglos in Montreal. That passion seems to have subsided now!

Since then, I have been writing, three books, a stage play based on my comic novel, THE UNDERDOGS, various magazine articles, and so on. In addition to publishing the books, I have spent a lot of time giving readings of them here and there, all in an effort to flog a few more copies! The publication of each book is generally quite an exciting event, because you give a few interviews and people want to hear you speak and you do public readings. I have also participated in one or two literary juries and discussion groups,

Right now, I'm involved in giving a workshop for young writers - not so young actually - on how to write non-fiction. Another thing I've done is to help edit books for other people. I am also preparing for an appearance at the Blue Metropolis Literary Festival here in Montreal. I have worked with them several times over the years.

Since you left the Board, you have published three books, CITY UNIQUE: MONTREAL DAYS AND NIGHTS IN THE 1940s AND '50s, GETTING STARTED: A MEMOIR OF THE 1950s and three years ago, CRAZY ABOUT LILI, about a college student who falls in love with a famous striptease queen, in 1948 Montreal. I read that it was on the Gazette's best-seller list for 18 weeks!



The most successful one was **CITY** UNIQUE, which sold very well. It was on the best-seller list in the Gazette for 17 months - quite often as No. 1. The book is still in print, still available, which is very gratifying, seeing it published a good many years ago, in 1996. People always ask you if you are going to write a sequel and of course

I'm not, because I want to do something different!

But CRAZY ABOUT LILY is in a sense related – it's about the city you've lived in and loved.

Well yes, it grew out of it - and somebody has bought the film rights, so it might turn into a Canadian feature film. I have my fingers crossed. They actually asked me if I would like to write the script and I said: "No!" I wanted to do something new.

So what's coming next?

Well, another novel, but don't hold your breath, it's going very slowly! I donate a lot of my papers to McGill, but I've still got an awful lot and I'm going through those and reading them - and it absorbs a lot of time. You get distracted reading all this old junk, but I'm a packrat and I keep things, so I'm doing that and working on the novel – and a few other projects.

Could you tell me about the agreement with McGill? How did that happen?

Well, I was giving a reading of something or other at McGill and a lady from the Rare Books and Special Collections came up to me and said: "Do you have any interesting old manuscripts and records and letters?" and I replied: "Yes, I have an awful lot of it!" So she said: "Well, we might be interested in looking at it". I spent quite a lot of time rounding it all up and getting it together and gave it to them. Now they have it there, somewhere, in boxes! And scholars have looked at them. I have a lot of letters there from Mordecai Richler, Brian Moore and Mavis Gallant. Being a packrat, I kept everything and there is a new book just out — a biography of Mordecai Richler, which quotes from my papers quite a bit.

I kept a lot of scripts from the Board, which I gave them too - I started out in the days when you wrote scripts for documentary films - and countless narrations! Now it's all up at McGill somewhere.

With all this work, do you ever get stressed?

I'm always feeling I'm not doing enough. I don't know why. I try not to get involved with projects with too many deadlines, but on the other hand I seem to set my own deadlines and get quite nervous if I'm not doing it. But I think that's normal. On the other hand, I have had great sessions of book reviewing and other activities. Variety is what appeals to me, because basically I am a dilettante, a little bit here and there!

A very important thing happened 3 years ago. You became an Officer of the Order of Canada. Could you tell us anything about that?

Well, I was very surprised! When they told me, I felt this was really just another bureaucratic mistake in Ottawa, that they were looking for somebody else and there was just a mistake on the computer. But I didn't turn it down, anyway! The meal that they give up at Rideau Hall is absolutely splendid. It gives you a real motive for being an Officer of the Order of Canada! They gave me quite a nice exaggerated citation, saying I'd done the country some good in the artistic field, and it was a very pleasant occasion.

Have you been travelling much?

Yes, fortunately we've managed to take a number of cruises. It's an easy way to get around. You don't have to pack and unpack every day! In the old days, you rented a car or bicycle or something and we did all that. But now Magda and I have done cruises in the South Pacific as far as Australia, and the Baltic as far as St. Petersburg, and up the west coast of the Atlantic and across to Ireland. This summer we are going on a river cruise down the Danube and we are looking forward to that.

Can you manage well on your treadmill?

Yes. I try to do a little exercise with my treadmill and some weights and things like that, but I don't break any speed limits. I've had two knee replacements, so I make a lot of noise when I go through the airport metal detectors! Although the left leg is shorter than the other, so I walk as if I'm drunk.....

The booth which attracted the most interest would be the Vet's since a dog was part of the exhibit. Also notable was The Rosemount Technology Center which showcased a robot.


Here are some questions which the children asked: «How many movies a year does the NFB make?»; «What type of movies?»; «What's your favourite movie, why?».
